GP Access and face to face appointments

GP access and face to face appointment availability is always a hot topic in the media, particularly since Covid. We would like to share some Upton specific statistics with you from 17th January 2022 to 15th January 2023:

We completed 63% more appointments per 1000 patients than the national average and 29% more than the Hereford and Worcestershire Integrated Care System average! Our wait time for an appointment was less than 1 day due to our "on-the-day" appointment booking system. Many GP practices have a 4 week wait.

On the topic of the busy telephone lines, use the call back system- it is brilliant! (And much more confidential for you than attending the surgery to discuss personal matters at the reception counter).

It's important to make sure your child is safe while using the internet, and that you're aware of the ways in which you can ensure your child is safe online. Online safety can greatly impact mental health and wellbeing. There are organisations that can help. If you're a young person concerned about your internet safety, and you're worried about telling people you know, there are websites that can help you. www.childline.org.uk www.nspcc.org.uk

Our face-to-face appointment percentage was 52%- We get no complaints about refusal to be seen face to face because, if there is a clinical need, you will be invited in without a doubt! If you specifically want to be seen face to face, we will do our best to honour this. Many of our patients find telephone appointments more convenient and in contrast to what the media might say, our GP's often prefer to see patients face to face!

We are continually monitoring and improving services based on listening to your feedback. We are now starting to see the positive effects of the new dispensary robotics. Next stop, looking at the queues!

100 Years Ago...

A Busy Nurse

The Annual Meeting of The Nursing Association was held in the Parish Room on Wednesday afternoon, March 28th, 1923. The Rector, Canon Edmondson, presided.

Upton's first parish nurse, Mrs Smith, had been appointed in 1877. She was to live in what is now 65, Old Street. The group of houses belonged to G. E. Martin, the Lord of the Manor. The Worcestershire Home for Trained Nurses was not set up until 1879, so Upton's scheme was, in this area, a pioneering venture. The nurse visited the sick poor in their homes, the importance of nursing was given great prominence at the time of Queen Victoria's Golden Jubilee in 1887. Upton's nurse was certainly busy: it was reported that in the 1880s the number of patients was 184 and the average number of home visits was 3,056. It was thought that the time had arrived for a nursing home, which would mean that, "in certain cases patients can be kept away from the discomfort of their own homes and under special medical treatment and attendance". The cottage next door to the nurse's was vacant, G. E. Martin was willing to make the necessary alterations: there would be room for two beds and possibly an extra one for emergencies. Very soon the first patient arrived: although the nursing home was not yet fully furnished, a little girl, Lily Priddy, was admitted. Each year from 1889 The Parish Magazine, and, later, The Upton News, carried a report of the Annual Meeting of the Nursing Home Committee. During the early years varying numbers of patients were taken into the nursing home during each year: 9 were reported at the 1889 A.G.M., 14 in 1893. The nurse continued visiting and midwifery was added to her case load: she made, for instance, 2,218 visits to 130 patients in 1889, and 3,149 visits to 174 patients in 1892.

Local Historian Simon Wilkinson looks back to Upton news content 100 years ago.

In the early years of the twentieth century changes occurred. There was an increasing deficit in the finances. and the use of the Nursing Home declined. It was said that only two patients had been admitted in 1906 and that in 1907 there had been none. There were reasons for the decline. The Isolation Hospital at West Bank had been opened in 1904, there was the increasing workload outside the Home. A review took place and, in 1910 it was decided to close the Home for the reception of patients and retain only the cottage where the nurse lived. This remained the nurse's residence until the late 1930s, but it was still often referred to, inaccurately, as "The Nursing Home".

In 1923 the Secretary gave "a most satisfactory report". Nurse Hayes had "entered upon her duties on April 8th, 1922. She had proved to be an excellent Nurse and had done her work thoroughly well." There had been an increase in maternity cases. Visits paid by the nurse during the year were : Maternity 479, Medical 286, Surgical 546, Infant Welfare 219, Schools and School Children 60, Tubercular 107, Casual 113. The Secretary reported that Nurse had been very busy all the year, that she had "won her way with the people and is popular with them".



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Each year I am thrilled to see the golden daffodils bravely waving in the breeze it's a sign that the harshness of winter is fading, and the joy of spring is bursting forth, ready for the first festival of the season.

HANLEY ROAD FLOODING UPDATE

The Hanley Road flooding problems are never far from my mind. After almost 18 months of badgering, Worcestershire County Council and the Environment Agency came to talk to you at a Upton public meeting. Five ingenious and positive suggestions were made by members of the public that I feel would make significant improvements to the flooding. Despite my urging, the present administration at County Hall are not moving forward with four of these valuable ideas due to lack of funding. I have written asking that we seek government assistance and funding. The fifth option is for the drains to be fitted with non return valves, because often, when the road is flooded, the river is lower. A survey has been undertaken and I will let you know the results when I have them. The County Council did produce an informative, and I think realistic report about the problems of the Hanley Road flooding. If anyone would like to read it please let me know.

JAZZ FESTIVAL IS GO

The Upton Jazz Festival starts this year on June 24th. I had the pleasure of presenting Jon Parsons and members of The Fringe, Upton Jazz with a cheque for £330 to help ensure they could run this year's Festival. Can I please thank all those who give up their time for free to support such a great event. Big festival organisers may come and go, but the local festivals are run by Upton for Upton.



Finally, I have been overwhelmed and grateful for all the kind words and wishes as I reach the dizzy age of 60. Where has all the time gone? Enjoy March and smile!

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CAN OUR COUNCIL DO MORE FOR OUR YOUNG PEOPLE?



Buses keep getting cut from rural areas, which causes massive problems for people who cannot drive. We often think about older residents who cannot get to the doctors, or hospital appointments, but we often forget about our

young people. The last survey done of young people's expectations and requirements was completed in 2018. That was before Covid and the lockdowns. Perhaps it is time that we thought again about what our young people want.

Growing up in a rural area can be difficult. We provide buses to get our kids to school, but after-hours events and an evening social life are now dependent on the taxi of Mum and Dad.

Organisations like The Cube in Malvern make great efforts in developing safe entertainment for our younger residents, but how do you get there if you live in a rural village? According to the 2018 survey, 50% of young people wanted to stay in the area on growing up, but is it no wonder that as soon as they can, our children leave to study in the bigger cities? We need to offer them something to stay.

And is the entertainment that we do provide geared towards older, rather than younger adults. How often does the "Flix in the Styx" roll out a classic drama, rather than a modern Marvel movie? And how well do we cater for young people at these events. Are we offering tea and coffee, rather than popcorn and pop? And how many of our village halls offer free Wi-Fi?

Malvern Hills District Council could do so much more for our young people. The last survey for young people showed that using the Phone for internet, and spending time with friends, were the top two activities for girls, and number two and four for boys, out of a list of 17 activities. (Top for boys was Gaming). Yet when we design new parks - as part of our planning process - we actually discourage building amenities for teenagers. We actively seek to minimise the attraction of play areas for older children. I would rather they were hanging around in a safe public space than on a street corner, or down a dark alley!

We can make our Public Open Space more accessible if we created shelters for people to meet, designed to minimise vandalism and litter, but enabled to let young people loiter, perhaps with free Wi-Fi zones and good lighting. Where we create events for young people, we should think about providing additional transport to get them safely to the event. A properly organized bus, with adult supervision, would not cost a huge amount more to the event organisers, and it could be subsidized by the Council. And we need to think more about how we bring the towns to the rural areas. There are services that are desperate to reach out into rural communities. Mobile pizza vans are a common site locally, but why doesn't the Council encourage local entrepreneurs to take the businesses out to the people. Can we co-ordinate food vans to work on different nights, and are there businesses that would relish getting our into the rural villages to deliver entertainment? Comedy in the Countryside? Battles of the bands? Let's set up a tour!

One of the reasons why we don't see any of these initiatives is that the local councils are run by old people, for old people. I was elected nearly eight years ago, and was considered a youngster, yet I can draw down my pension this summer as I reach 55. We need younger people to get involved, to make sure that they are represented. And we need older people to start thinking about how hard it can be for a young person to be growing up in the countryside today. After all, we will all be relying on them one day!







Update from County Councillor: Tom Wells

I am delighted to have been invited to contribute an article to our very impressive Upton News Magazine.

As County Councillor I represent many of the villages, such as Longdon, Welland, Hanley Castle and Hanley Swan. The people and places of my Division are very important to me. But, in May last year, I was also asked to serve as Leader of Malvern Hills District Council. This is a huge honour and a role I take very seriously. I can't pretend it has been easy and, like many local residents, I can become frustrated with the time it takes to get things done.

'They' are the people behind the Upton Festivals and so many of our local groups and organisations. I could go on...

And all these volunteers give up their time for no return, save the satisfaction that they are making a difference. Times change and fresh challenges emerge. And as they do, I am very confident our communities will rise to the occasion.

We owe each and every volunteer, whether now or in the past, a huge debt of gratitude. And perhaps we should remember that 'they' are doing their very best. It is all too easy to take all these volunteers for granted. Such people are the lifeblood of our communities.

My job is to support all the positive things that are going on and, where needed, help access and deliver vital funding for them. In recent years that has included grants to local schools, sports clubs and village halls.

In my role as District Council Leader, I am very keen to get out and meet local residents. That's why the very first thing I did as the new Council Leader was to set up monthly 'Talk to Tom' sessions where members of the public can raise any issue they wish directly with me. I am bringing the next sessions to Upton Memorial Hall on Monday 6th March from 10.00 am until midday. 

WALKING

Whether you're looking to walk the whole length of the ridge, looking for somewhere to walk your four-legged friend or for something a little more gentle along our Easier Access trails, then the Malvern Hills and Commons has something for everyone.

Whilst walkers have a right of access across all land under the care of the Malvern Hills Trust which means that you can explore the Hills and Commons we ask that visitors keep to established paths wherever possible in order to minimise disturbance to wildlife or grazing animals. Please take notice of signage and access restrictions that are put in place for your safety or to protect some of the sensitive wildlife and heritage areas on the Hills.



WALKING WITH DOGS

Responsible dog owners are welcome to the Hills and Commons. To keep you, your dog and the wildlife of the area safe, please follow the dog walking code of conduct.

- Please keep your dog under close control at all times
- Take extra care when near livestock. Livestock worrying, including chasing, is a crime. When pregnant, sheep may also abort if frightened.
- Please ensure your dog is wormed as parasites can pass from dogs to livestock and people.
- Please take heed of ground-nesting bird signs where birds are known to be nesting and keep yourself and your dog on the path in these areas.
- Please clean up after your dog and take your dog's waste home, or put it in a dog poo bin.

EASIER ACCESS

The main ridgeline and the slopes of the Malvern Hills are steep but there are options if you're looking for a gentler walk or access for families or for wheelchair users.

Within school we have a school's council who look for a variety of ways they can support charitable organisations that provide help to our school. As a church school we have working on courageous advocacy and the definition from the Church of England means: 'a long-term legacy, an endowment to future generations'. Our children through the school's council have chosen to support the Midlands Air Ambulance and we have a long history dating back to 2014 of raising money for this valuable and locally based charity. This year we decided to 'WEAR IT RED' on Valentine's Day to show our love for

the dedication and care the Air Ambulance service provides for everyone within Worcestershire. We joined with around thirty-one other schools within Worcestershire and nearly every primary school across the Malvern/Upton area wore red to raise money for this important charity. As a school we raised £563.44.

Our school's Council have been researching the valuable work of the Midlands Air Ambulance Charity. They have found out the following facts:

- Since the Air Ambulance first started there have been 70,723 missions
- During December 2022 the air ambulance was involved in 336 missions
- Each Air Ambulance mission costs an average of £2,950
- Each critical care mission costs £288 on average
 - The charity does not receive funding from the Government for its daily missions so relies entirely on the support and generosity of local people and business



Upton Furniture Store, established in 2012 by Bob Davis, is considered the town's hidden gem by its local customer base. Having spent much of his career developing a reputation as a venerable fitting and furnishing expert, Bob is affectionately referred to as 'Bob the Bed Man', with many residents speaking highly of his business and the curated service it provides. Last month, I sat down with Bob and the team to discuss the origin of Upton Furniture Store and its commitment to quality products and customer service. Upton Furniture Store's inception can be traced back to 2001, when Bob inherited a Birminghambased bed shop. Surplus stock for this shop was stored in a warehouse in Welland, and when the shop was eventually sold, the new owners decided against taking this merchandise with them. Needing to move the stock, Bob followed the suggestion of a friend and took it to Wellesbourne Market, which consisted of roughly five hundred traders spread across an airfield south of Warwick. 'As it transpired, it was probably the largest Saturday market in the UK', Bob recounts. He was able to sell the first van-load of stock within a few minutes, encouraging him to take a regular pitch on the market. Several years later, the business would find a permanent home on Rectory Road, from which it would develop its reach nationwide.

The business' unique selling point is the care, attention and quality products each client receives, derived from Bob's extensive industry experience. During his time with the Birmingham bed shop, Bob developed strong working relationships with several key furniture manufacturers and suppliers, which were keen to continue trade with Bob once the shop was sold. As a result, Upton Furniture Store maintains an extensive supply of quality products designed to suit the needs of any potential client. Bob's team deliver furniture across the country on a regular basis, having supplied



luxury accommodation sites from Cornwall to Whitby. Notable regular customers include The Mount Pleasant Hotel in Great Malvern and The Engine Shed in Whitby. Prospective customers can visit these business' websites and view the image galleries for examples of high-guality furnishings, sourced via Bob and the team. Currently, the team are constantly on-thego and may work off-site throughout the week. To avoid a wasted journey, clients are encouraged to pre-book appointments, whereby they can seek consultation over their individual requirements and view a range of available furniture. Although the site doesn't offer a large showroom akin to a typical high-street chain shop, the store uses this to its advantage, keeping overheads low and concentrating on the quality of service. 'It's like coming into a house, a relaxed environment where everyone gets on.' Bob explains, 'If you go into a big shop and buy a bed, about seventy-five to eighty percent of what you're paying goes into running the shop. You're only getting about twenty percent of your money going into the product you're buying. We haven't got those overheads, so the percentage is swung back in the customer's favour. Hence, we can sell the same - if not better - quality products as these top-range shops, at a fraction of the price.'

Upton Furniture Store's focus on customer care doesn't end with the initial consultation, however. Bob's team will deliver the products to the customer's door, move it to their room of choice, assemble it as per the customer's requirements and recycle the packaging.

There are no hidden costs in this service, as Bob explains 'I've always sworn, to whoever I've employed over the years, that is what you do, those people love you to bits by the time you've walked out of that house. They're going to come back to you.' Upton Furniture Store offers free local delivery, up to a twenty mile radius.

It's clear that customers can avoid the potential risks and issues of online shopping by opting for a bespoke local service akin to Upton Furniture Store, as team-member Neil summarises, 'Bob can answer any queries you may have, about the products, the ranges, the styles, what will best suit you... there's nothing he can't do.' 

Guest Column by Harriett Baldwin MP

Many of you will share my frustration about the decision to close the popular Malvern Hills College. It is a huge loss to the community, and I have been working closely with Worcestershire County Council, Malvern Hills District Council and the Bransford Trust to promote a strong



bid to buy the site from the current owners, Warwickshire College Group. I have repeatedly called for the Group to accept mediation of to negotiate a settlement but instead they want to sue our council to challenge the covenant which protects the site for educational purposes. In recent weeks the Education Secretary and Skills Minister have called on WCG to end the legal challenge and do a deal. I hope this happens very soon to allow teaching to return to Malvern in September.

Its good to hear that last year's data shows that 32 more GPs working in primary care across our local NHS and I am pleased that a brand new medical school is opening in Worcester allowing local people to study medicine and hopefully start their long careers working in the county health system. I do want to see local students enrolling there and the Worcestershire MPs have together lobbied the Department for Health and Social Care to increase investment to support this new teaching resource.

I'm also hopeful that teaching will be part of the mix as work gets underway to transform the historic Malvern Theatre. I worked closely with the bid team to ensure that the second bid to the Levelling Up Fund was successful, and I've been insistent that the plans include effort to engage with the less well-off communities in Malvern who may not have engaged with the arts and there are plans for learning spaces to encourage local people to get more involved in the creative and digital industries. It's also a huge boost for the local economy. The theatre already brings visitors to Malvern who spend money on travel and hospitality and support local businesses and I am delighted that this nearly £20 million investment will transform a valuable local visitor attraction and hopefully improve life chances for many local people.

Hope Church - Funeral Service For All

Not long after the Queen's funeral, a vicar was asked, "Can I have one like that?" Well, clearly the crowds, cathedrals and military parades are a little beyond our control. But the rest was the perfectly normal, but enormously adaptable, Church of England funeral service, available to everyone, even if you aren't remotely religious.

Here are a few other questions vicars get asked about funerals: Do you have to go to church to have a funeral service in church? No. Whoever you are, whatever you believe, you are entitled to a Church of England funeral in your local parish church.

Does it have to be a traditional funeral service? No. We'll work with your next of kin to produce something that is personal to you. Whether you want hymns or Elvis, you can.

Do I have to have a burial? No. Funeral services can begin in church and finish at the crematorium, or the other way round. Either way we will always help you explore the options.

Can I be buried in the churchyard? Not all our churchyards are open. But generally, if you live in that parish, yes.

Can vicars do services at the Crematorium? Yes, we do lots of them, and are always happy to help.

What's best, a service in church, or the crematorium? They both have their strengths. Services in church are great because they're local, and don't have the time constraints they do at the crematorium. Can you do the service without knowing the deceased? Often, we do know them! But even if we don't, it can be an advantage

to have someone leading the

Hanley School Letters from Auschwitz Project

Whilst there is rightly a specific focus on the anniversary to remember the atrocities and its victims, The Holocaust Education Trust, has an ongoing mission is to educate every person from every background in the UK about the Holocaust and its contemporary relevance.

Hanley Castle High School annually takes part in the Holocaust Education Trust's 'Letters from Auschwitz Project', an educational project that offers post-16 students the opportunity to learn about the Holocaust and importantly, consider its relevance for today, sharing that with their peers.



Very little, save perhaps the horrors of the slave trade, poses such questions to faith than the Holocaust. The unimaginable suffering and death endured by so many, and the equally unimaginable evil that planned and put plans for mass extermination into effect, defies belief. Yet, of course, it was all too true and the lives of countless Jewish people today have been changed forever, shaped by the awful reality of the ghettos and concentration camps and the memory of loved ones murdered and families forever scarred.

How could God have let that happen? I have no answers. Simply questions. We must remember that the atrocities of Auschwitz and its sister camps were committed by humans – ordinary people, who, somehow, felt justified in denigrating and denying the humanity of others. Tragically, terrifyingly and shockingly, prejudice and sheer hatred still does the same today.

Our world often feels fragile and vulnerable and we cannot be complacent or forget the horrors of the past. It is in remembering that we realise that prejudice and the language of hatred needs to be challenged everyday and we each have the responsibility to stand up for justice,

Nurse Practitioner trekking to Everest Base Camp to fundraise for life-saving charity work



A Nurse Practitioner who helps save lives both at work and in her free time is undertaking a mammoth 15-day round trek to Everest Base Camp in an effort to raise vital funds for the volunteer Severn Area Rescue Association (SARA) charity. Pauline Burton, from

Highley, works as an Emergency

Nurse Practitioner in the Alexandra Hospital's A&E department, as well as volunteering for the Severn Area Rescue Association – a volunteer lifeboat and inland search and rescue charity – which her high altitude expedition is fundraising in aid of.

The epic trek in March will cover around 130km including nearly 9,000 feet of elevation gain. Pauline, 54, has been training for the challenge for almost a year in order to be fit and ready for the physical exertions of mountain walking in the Himalayas, including taking part in VO2 max testing to check the amount of oxygen she uses during exercise.

After reaching Everest Base Camp (where March temperatures can often reach -25 degrees

Celsius), Pauline plans to summit Kala Patthar – a mountain 18,204ft (5,550m) above sea level where you can watch the sunrise over the summit of Mount Everest. Pauline volunteers as an operational crew member with the SARA charity in her free time, based at the Kidderminster Fire Station, just one of seven lifeboat and inland rescue stations located along the length of the River Severn. She holds a powerboat licence and is qualified in swift water rescue, entering high flood water to rescue people.

Last year the SARA charity was called out more than 110 times, providing inshore lifeboat, cliff, mud and flood rescue, as well as land search across an area covering more than 20,000 square kilometres. If you'd like to donate to the Severn Area Rescue Association (SARA) in




